Home Reading

Home reading is expected for all students. Students reading ability is improved through home reading by; students practicing, reading aloud, and applying learnt reading strategies. Parents taking an interest in students learning, listening to children read and discussing what has been read and all vital in ensuring students learn the importance of reading. For some students, parents or older siblings may listen to and assist with reading. For some students, children may read independently at home.

Please make sure reading logs are initialed each night students read. This home reading will be tracked by the teacher. Students displaying high levels of commitment to reading over the term receive a book prize at the assembly.

At school we are increasing our time spent reading. Students will complete buddy reading; reading a known text to another student. This will increase students reading fluency and accuracy.

Our Year Six students; Lucy and Abby were presented with their Year 6 shirts last Friday. A big thank you to Chelsea for her organisation of this and last minute editting.




Puppet Making

NAPLAN National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy 2017

Years 3 and 5 students in all government and non-government schools will sit the NAPLAN in 2018. The program assesses literacy and numeracy.

Tests will be sat across Australia on the same dates.

- Tuesday 15th May: Language and Conventions (spelling, punctuation and grammar) and Writing
- > Wednesday 16th May: Reading
- > Thursday 17th May: Numeracy

PE Sessions – skipping

This term students will learn skipping skills as part of PE sessions after recess. Students will be developing individual skills using a single rope as well as group skipping using the long rope.

K-4 Numeracy Sessions

In Numeracy students in K-4 have started using Number Talks to develop our Mathematical language, questioning and reasoning skills. We have been learning to use efficient strategies for counting. Students pictured are counting counters into tens frames, and Counting by 10s to find the total number of counters. This week we will continue to develop our number knowledge including place value and number patterns.



Celebrate Attendance

Hints and Tips No. 3: Writing notes



Parents or caregivers are required by law to provide an explanation to the principal to say why their child was absent from school.

A note of explanation should contain:

- 1. Date that the note was written;
- 2. Child's name;
- 3. Days/dates the child was absent from school;
- 4. The reason the child was absent;
- 5. The signature of the childs parent or caregiver.

If more than one child from the same family has been absent a separate note for each child should be written.

A note should be brought to school on the first day the student returns to school after an absence. Your school is required to investigate all unexplained absences (where a child has been absent and no explanation has been received) within two days.

Did your child give the note to their teacher? This can sometimes be a problem with younger children.

Celebrate Attendance

Hints and Tips No. 4: Good Attendance



There are a number of sound reasons for you to ensure that your child attends school regularly.

Firstly, attending school every day makes learning easier. For younger students, missing the basic skills often leads to learning problems later on and for older student's absenteeism often interferes with academic progress. Friendships with other students are also easier if your child attends school regularly.

The law in NSW states that all children between the ages of 6 and 17 years are required to attend school. Sickness or injury, attendance at a special religious ceremony or a serious family situation are satisfactory reasons for non-attendance. Please let the school know why your child is not at school and provide an explanation on your child's return to school.

Birthdays, haircuts, pension days, Mondays etc are not satisfactory reasons for absence from school. Also try whenever possible to arrange your holidays in school vacation times.
